




Nasreen's Secret School: A True Story from Afghanistan by Jeanette Winter

This book is inspired by a true story and talks about the power of education that changed the life of a little girl.







This book may be suitable for high schools or for adults. The topic of intercultural bitterness is explored, within the young people of Algerian Arab origin in the cities of France.






The Proudest Blue by Ibtihaj Mohamed
